SERMON NOTES

In Colossians 3, Paul clearly taught there is a difference, a before and after reality, when one comes to know Jesus Christ as personal Savior and Lord. The first words found in verse five, "therefore consider," are tied directly back to verse one where Paul says "If then you were raised with Christ."

Paul was saying, if you have experienced the transforming power of God, you are challenged to abandon your old lifestyle and adopt the lifestyle that represents Christ. People should be able to tell the difference between those who are Christians and those who are not.

Key thought: When Christ is your life, the transformation begins with the inner man and is manifest/displayed in the way you act.

EXPLANATION

Matthew 15:19; Romans 12:1-2; Romans 1:24; Philippians 2:5

The transformation of the inner man includes...

- 1. What you think about yourself. (verse 5)
- 2. What you believe about God's judgment. (verses 6-7)
- 3. What you think about others. (verses 8-11)

The problem is not what is on the outside that gets in, it's what is on the inside. You are what you are because of who you are on the inside.
